#### Just some reflections...

Last year I got hearing aids. Working around jet planes when I was in the NAVY did damage to my hearing and I finally had some tests and was told I needed some help. I was amazed when I put those new hearing aids in my ears and started driving home. I heard things I hadn't heard for years. The noise of the air whistling around the car. The wind blowing in the trees. Birds singing. Voices that used to be murmurs were now clear conversations. I could even hear the sound of my shoes shuffling across the carpet.

This got me thinking. There are a lot of sounds that I associate with Seyfert Camp, so again I took a trip down memory lane. For some reason, the first memory was the sound of Blue Jays screaming at each other in the oak trees. Hearing the faint whistle of a train in the distance, and listening to it become louder the closer it got. The sounds of katydids giving their evening serenades in the trees. The sound of the bell on the old dormitory (now behind the tabernacle), calling us to service. Who can forget the little hand-held bell that served two purposes. It was used as the "rising bell" and most of us hated to hear that one. But it was also the bell rung to call us to the dining hall for meals. There were the sounds of laughter and playing. The sounds of the traffic driving by the camp. Sometimes, as they drove by, "irreverent" youths would blow their car horn, trying to disrupt the services. Sometimes we heard the sound of a fire truck or ambulance driving past with its sirens wailing.

A couple other "sounds" came to mind. Years ago, men gathering before evening service to pray on the west side of the camp. (There used to be a dirt road going up there.) We would hear the prayers getting louder and louder. Or walking by a cabin that was having a cottage prayer meeting and hearing earnest entreaties that God would move in the services. Remembering, as a child, learning and singing in Children's Meetings. The camp congregational singing and music - I can't begin to describe it! It would stir your soul and lift your spirits. We also had a small orchestra that played each evening. I heard some of the best evangelists preach with power and unction. I heard people get blessed and praise God. I heard sinners pray for forgiveness as their lives were changed.

There are many other sounds we could add. Some of them are still being made, just as when I was a boy. And there are new ones being made. Church services being held in Spanish. Gospel Blue Grass singing the last Friday night of camp. "Big Wheels" zipping down our new sidewalk. Teens chatting as they scatter on a scavenger hunt. The hum of conversation as people eat at the dining hall deck or visit in the snack store. And sometimes, there is a rare and wonderful time when all conversation and noise fade and the sound of silence takes over for the night. These are all great sounds!

## Can you help?

There is an expression that says, "Out of sight, out of mind." For many of our camp family members, Seyfert Camp is far from our thinking at this time of the year. Most thoughts have been about the Thanksgiving holiday and are now turning to the delightful season and preparations for Christmas.

## **Tree Removal Update**

In the last Camp Communicator we informed you that some of the old trees at the camp were dying and would be removed. During the week of Thanksgiving the tree service company removed twelve large trees from around camp buildings and cottages. They also dropped four other dangerous trees. Most of them had to be removed by crane. Others need to be sawed up and removed by volunteers.
