Founders Fellowship Banquet

As you are well aware, because of the Corona 19 virus, the year 2020 had some rather unexpected and negative consequences concerning Seyfert Camp. Along with canceling Family Camp, we also had to cancel all groups that were scheduled to use the camp. We also had to cancel our annual fundraiser, the Founders Fellowship Banquet._

While God has marvelously provided funds to keep our camp operational, last year was our lowest income year since we incorporated in 2001. We really need our annual fundraiser. We are asking all of our camp family to consider attending our fundraiser and supporting the camp this year.

There are a few things I need to mention:

-We have changed the date from April 24, 2021 to May 22, 2021. The meal is at noon.

- -We hope to have the banquet in the dining hall. If that's not allowed, weather permitting, we may have our meal outside (either in open tents or on the deck at the dining hall. Or, if rainy weather, it may be held in the tabernacle). This would allow us to observe social distancing if the Corona 19 virus is still causing restrictions.
- -We will do everything we can to sterilize all equipment, chairs and tables, and the restrooms so everyone can feel safe.
 - -There will be camp updates and special singing.
 - -Big John Nolt's Catering will be providing the meal.
- -Finally, this meal is free but we hope you will bring a generous donation to help us continue the ministries of our camp.

Water and the Pump House

It seems that some things that should be relatively simple can turn into something complex. For some time now our Camp Board has been wanting to build a new pump house and install a new water meter. It turns out that this will be a bigger and more expensive project than we anticipated.

After talking to township leaders and water treatment experts, we were told we will need to install a purifier for our water. This is not optional. We did not anticipate the scope of what is required or the added expense - and It will be expensive. In the past few weeks a new pump house was built and installed, and the water pump has been replaced. Now we must install some type of purifier and we are still getting information about which system would be best. This must be taken care of before our Summer activities begin. Having clean, safe water is imperative.

I spent quite a while looking through the hundreds of pictures on my computer because I wanted everyone to see the condition of the old pump house and why we are replacing it, but I couldn't find a picture of it. (Betsy said she doesn't take pictures of ugly things!)



A few weeks ago this shed replaced the old cinder block pump house. There is still a lot of work to do to install a new pump, new pipes, and a water meter. Then a water purification system will be added.

These improvements should give us cleaner water with less minerals like iron, magnesium, etc.

We appreciate those who donated toward this project and those who are doing the work. John Fleece took this picture of the new shed when he was working on it recently.

Wooten Building Addition

In the past Camp Communicators, we shared that the Camp Board is planning to add onto the Wooten Building in order to have adequate room for our toddlers and juniors during Family Camp. Getting permits, blueprints and engineering plans is taking much more time than we expected and is very frustrating, as more paperwork is required.

Now we must resolve our water situation before we can move on with this addition. When it is resolved and we finally get all the paperwork for the addition done, Dave Taylor will begin a fundraiser to pay for it. He will be contacting many of you personally, telling what is needed and the costs for certain items. We hope you will prayerfully consider what you can give to help us get much needed rooms for our children.

Spring Work Days and Opening the Grounds

Welcome spring! And with the coming of spring, camp activities begin. In early March the buildings were opened; however, the water to the cottages and RV sites will not be turned on again until we have the pump house and purifier operating. (In the meantime, the Wooten building restrooms will be open.) There will be cleaning to do and repairs to make. Also, painting, carpentry work, lawn and flower work, putting out the park benches and picnic tables, power washing buildings, cleaning rooms, and setting up tables and chairs.

We have often mentioned how much we appreciate the volunteers who do so much of the maintenance and upkeep of the camp. Without these wonderful people, we would have to pay lots of money to have the necessary work done. We would also have to raise the camp fees significantly.

We invite you to come to our next work days. They will be held on **Friday**, **April 16th and Saturday**, **the 17th**. We will start the days with coffee and donuts. Meals will be provided - the noon meal on both days and the evening meal on Friday.

Since some ladies often bring dishes of food, casseroles, or desserts, she asks if you would call her if you plan to bring something for the meal.
